The City of Denver website (<u>www.DenverGov.org/DenverRecycles</u>) lists all items that can be recycled in the purple bin or composted in the green bin. The site also has a searchable database that allows you to type in the name of an item to find out if it can be recycled and where.

Did you know that **textiles** are the second most polluting industry on earth behind only oil and gas? Currently, 85% of clothing is thrown out. Every clothing item donated saves 7 pounds of CO2 from the atmosphere and 2,700 liters of water. **arc Thrift Stores** is a non-profit organization dedicated to individuals living with intellectual/ developmental disabilities. They accept donations of any clothing, household goods, furniture, sporting goods and small electronic appliances in good working order. When the quality isn't high enough for US consumers, arc bundles the clothes and sells garments abroad where there is still value for many of these items. Blue Star Recyclers is a nonprofit that creates jobs for people with autism and other disabilities through recycling electronics for a small fee. They are certified at the highest environmental standards for e-recycling. They accept all computers and computer equipment including printers, all TVs and monitors, VCRs, DVD, stereos, consoles, small appliances such as microwaves, coffeemakers, toasters, lamps, vacuum cleaners, all wire and connectors, alkaline and rechargeable batteries, fluorescent bulbs: www.bluestarrecyclers.com (303-534-1667, 953 Decatur Street).

SustainAbility's Hard-to-Recycle Center is a non-profit that serves clients with intellectual disabilities. They charge a \$3 entrance fee or a price-per-item/pound depending on the material. They accept a wide range of items from vegetable oil to books to propane tanks to pots & pans and tennis balls! See the website for a list: www.sustainability-recycling.com (1270 S. PaintCare is funded by a fee paid by paint manufacturers for each can of paint they sell in Colorado. The paint is remixed into recycled paint, used as fuel, made into other products or properly disposed. For drop-off sites go to <u>www.paintcare.org</u> or call 855-724-6809.

Did you know that between 20 and 40 million mattresses end up in the landfill each year? **Springback Colorado** picks up and recycles mattresses while employing disenfranchised workers: <u>www.springbackco.org</u> (720-515-1328).

RAFT Colorado is a nonprofit that accepts a variety of items to be used by local school teachers in the classroom. They accept manufacturing and packaging materials, bottle caps, corks and miscellaneous other items. Terracycle is an innovative recycling company that recycles the most difficult items including candy wrappers and drink pouches. You pay a fee to have a box for specific items sent to your house. The fee includes the cost of mailing the box back to Terracycle once you have filled it. We encourage you to share the box and cost with neighbors! If you are a business or community group, they do have some free programs sponsored by brand names that need public drop-off sites. See their website for details: <u>www.terracycle.com</u>.
